Special memories and photographs, following the 90th anniversary of the opening of our Head Office building on 24th October 1932.


First, from the (7) Merseyside In Focus | Facebook page, there are several photographs of our

Head Office building under construction. The first (right) being of the marble columns being turned in a






right) and the obligatory 'Group Photograph' (top of second column), which appears to have been taken in the same position as the above photograph and long-

At the top of Page 2, and already sandbagged against bombing raids, with our Head Office building in the background, this photograph of Liverpool Town Hall was taken on 20th September 1939, just 17 days after the outbreak of the Second World War and can be viewed at @hiddenliverpool where a visiting member commented:

My grandad worked in the boiler room and was a Fire Warden during the Second World War'



Isn't it amazing that, when we tend to forget non-clerical staff, our major office buildings could not have functioned without them and the larger the building, the more-essential 'nonclerical' staff became.

As the Second World War progressed, how fortunate were we on the night of 12th May 1941?

OBITUARY

CHRISTOPHER JEFFERSON BARKER

1938 - 2022

Chris left Calday Grange Grammar School on the Wirral in 1954 and joined Martins



Bank at West
Kirby (below),
aged 16. He said of the
branch "there can have been
no better place to start work
thanks to manager Eric
Wylie". After a couple of

years, he went on District

Relief and travelled widely across the Wirral working first at New Brighton followed by



Ellesmere Port,
Toxteth in
Liverpool, Little
Sutton, Upton and
Birkenhead
Borough Road
where one of his

jobs on a Saturday

afternoon was to collect the takings from Tranmere Rovers when they had a home game and put it in the night safe.

After three years on Relief and hungry for foreign travel he saw an advert for Barclays DCO and decided to apply. He was successful and joined Barclays DCO in Liverpool in 1958. Chris spent four years with DCO including time in Nigeria. On home leave in April 1961 he married Audrey and they returned to Nigeria together.

Wishing to return home, now with wife Audrey and baby daughter Caroline, he wrote to **John Pickering**, **Staff Manager** at **Head Office** asking to return, having been told he would not be able to when he left. By then Martins was expanding so on return he was offered a job in



Leicester. Hotel Street (left) starting in 1963. Chris had to stay in lodgings for a before year he allowed to was buy a house! In April 1964 he completed his

Institute exams becoming an AIB. During his time in Leicester a second daughter Sarah was born.

After a period in Midland District Office working with **Warwick Isle** on the advances section Chris was appointed Pro Manager at



Head Street, Colchester. It was during this time that the merger of Martins and Barclays was announced. Chris wondered if he was unusual

having been employed by Martins twice and Barclays twice. Later, Chris became Assistant District Manager in Ipswich LHO.

Chris's last appointment was as Manager at Woodbridge in 1979 until his retirement in 1989. On retirement Chris remained in Suffolk enjoying an active retirement close to family.

OUR FORMER BRANCHES THEN and NOW

During a recent visit to our son, who lives 10 miles from Plymouth, I couldn't resist the short train ride inro Plymouth to check on the state of one of our major southern branches. Pictured below in its early days, with a pristine Coat of



Arms looking down on Armada Way in the Cornwall Street area of the city. Last month,



the branch was still there, the saplings have grown into mature trees and our once-proud grasshopper and liver bird, like the branch, closed and on the market, is looking neglected but at lest it is still there, just like us. We can only hope that



some time in the future it will be restored to its former glory.

A similar situation exists in Huddersfield,





which I visited whilst waiting for my car to have a software update. In the 1960s we used to have 'mechanics', now we have 'technicians'.

That said, and despite only 31 of our branches still remaining open, our name has not changed on the high streets of many towns and cities throughout

the country, just as it does in **Huddersfield**, at our former **Westgate** branch here its major relationship was **Standard Fireworks**.

. Although slightly different in its appearance during its Martins days, and now a part of a



Yorkshire Indian restaurant chain, little has changed. However, in a slightly different design, our Coat of Arms is still clearly evident above the entrance, and possibly unique, displaying the liver bird and dates '1831 and 1918' on either side of it, with Gresham's grasshopper and '1563 beneath. Which begs the question, (jokingly) popular in politics today;

'Did Martins have a 'North/South Divide'? To which, the simple answer must be; 'YES'!

'MARTIN'S BANK', as we all know, with its apostrophe was a 'Southern' bank with mainly 'Southern' staff which, following its merger



with **The Bank of Liverpool**, northern-based staff started to be transferred south. Some of our southern members might remember **Peter Hole**, (left), who joined Martins in 1959, at

South Audley Street branch, but, by 1966, who was Pro Manager at the branch between 1966 and '68. Our northern members will also remember Bernard Whiteley, (right), who succeeded Peter, as Pro




Manager at **Westgate**, in 1968 after joining Martins at our **Silver Street**, **Halifax** branch in 1952. But, once merged, our merged bank forgot both the divide and the apostrophe.

Although some of our former branches continue to display our name in various forms, in others it is, sadly, lost for ever. However, thanks to the ethical approach adopted by the new owners of our former Head office building, Kinrise, we can look forward in eager anticipation of enjoying our beautiful building being restored to its former glory once again. With this in mind, once completed, I would encourage our southern-based members to attend whatever functions we are permitted to arrange in Water Street.



A 90th BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

As we all worked for Martins it is obvious that we are, dare I say, 'old' rather than 'young' and many of our members are over 90 years of age; and now, our former Head Office building has joined these ranks as another nonagenarian. To celebrate its opening on 24th October 1932, 'The Architects' Journal' published as supplement in celebration of the completion of the building, from which I will publish extracts in future Newsletters.
