May I also mention that, on the page "Meet the Staff" of Huddersfield, Market Place, I am shown as Assistant Manager from 1960 to 1965. I was, in fact, Assistant Manager from 1960 to 1962 and Manager from 1963 to 1965.

May I make a final observation: About the displeasure that many staff felt about the "merger" with Barclays, as I was very much involved in this. Since 1919, there had been an unwritten rule that bank mergers would not be allowed, but by the early sixties the view was growing that the UK banking structure needed strengthening. In 1967, Aubrey Jones' Prices and Incomes Board Report' indicated that bank mergers would probably be approved if they led to a rationalisation of branch networks and, from that point onwards, there was a fairly chaotic round of meetings between Bank Chairmen and the Bank of England Governor. 'Market Forces' took over; skip the detail and just consider that Martins' shares, which stood at 19/- in August '67 had soared to 32/6 in December and to the very generous offer price of 35/6 in January '68; and that was the end of the independence of Martins Bank. There was no way those forces could be resisted.

I believe that most of the senior staff would have preferred a merger with Westminster Bank, but, although the Governor of the Bank of England, seems to have favoured such a link, it is also said that the Westminster would not have paid a 'silly price'. So the 'Golden days' were over, and we became BARCLAYS, and had to look to the opportunities which belonging to a larger Group had to offer: It was all done in the rather gentlemanly, civilised way of that time and the staff should,

perhaps, be thankful that they were not subjected to the market forces which rule today!

I hope that you find this of interest. Incidentally, after Huddersfield, I went to Head Office as Joint Superintendent of Branches and it was as an Assistant General Manager that I worked on the material for the Prices and Incomes Board, the Monopolies Commission and the "merger" itself. With thanks to both Jonathan and The British Newspaper Archive Isn't it strange how little you know about your original bank branch, or possibly not?

One fact about 77, North Street, Keighley about which I was completely unaware, until recently, was that it is **Grade II Listed** and is described as:

Bank. c1900. Ashlar. Italianate style. 2 storeys, 4 x 3 bays. Plinth. Ground floor rusticated with large, round-headed openings and impost string. Cornice. Ist floor has rusticated quoins and segment-headed windows in moulded surrounds under segmental 'eyebrow' pediments on brackets. Bold modillion eaves cornice and blocking course stepped up in centre.

However, the current, although still imposing, building is not the original Craven Bank Branch, which was located elsewhere, as the following Ordnance Survey maps reveal. Despite the 'Listing' stating: 'Bank. c1900' the extract from the1891 Ordnance Survey map (surveyed in 1890) clearly illustrates that the building had been



constructed earlier, with the railings, which are evident in Julian Taylor's photograph along with the Post Box in the bottomleft hand corner.

Also evident, carved into the stone tablet in the centre of the building, are the words: 'CRAVEN BANK'.

However, the original Craven Bank branch was opened in 1840 and there is no sign of our building in the

'O.S' map of 1852, which was surveyed in 1849



and the site then occupied by a 'Botanic Lodge'.

Just as in other towns and cities; how times have changed! I took the photograph (above right) a



few years ago but the branch hasn't changed since, apart from the front door badly needing a coat of varnish. And, finally; a Craven Bank cheque (above right) copied from Wikipedia drawn on Keighley branch, but when? Could George Martin help to identify the date?

DAVID PINNELL (27th July 1942-10th April 2023) David started his career with Martins in 1966 at our London Office, 68 Lombard Street, working in

dealing Registrar's Department, shareholders' register for the Bank, and for other companies on whose behalf the Bank acted as Registrar.

Following the takeover, in 1969, in 1972, Barclays announced that they would be moving the Registrar's Department to their new centre at Radbroke Hall. When Barclays closed Registrar's, David transferred to Barclays National Records Centre in Wythenshawe, where he worked until he retired.

Looking back on his long career, he enjoyed recalling the more unusual experiences, including: The time he had spent doing a daily commute by plane from Southend to Liverpool to work in our Head Office; his involvement in finding records relating to high-profile criminal cases, and the time he was drafted in to work through the night at an airport branch when a number of international flights were diverted there, creating something of a rush on the foreign exchange till.

David answered the call for volunteers to work in the Bank's archives, jumping at the chance. The work involved inputting customer names from 19th century ledgers into a database and David excelled at it. He loved to set himself a target for how many pages he would get through in his two-hour session, and would frequently turn up early to sneak in a few extra pages. When other volunteers were unable to attend through illness, David would volunteer to do extra sessions, and at the start of this year he started to do a whole day on a Friday. His obvious excitement, at the age of 80, at doing a full day in the office was touching.

There was plenty of time for a good lunch, and to visit Penderyn Whiskey Distillery which we had found a reference to on Google, and we had a jolly time.

The return 3 hours trip was delayed a while as the increasing level of the tide meant the angle of the gangplank was unhelpful, and the Captain had to request all passengers already on board sitting on the Starboard side to switch to Port. Otherwise we got back to Liverpool in very good shape on a beautiful evening. We wouldn't have missed it for anything.
